**Abstract:** Papers of a judge of the U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals, Eighth Circuit, 1917-1947 (presiding judge, 1928-1947), who continued to work with the court after his retirement in 1947. Topics covered in the papers include the U.S. courts; Democratic politics; Kansas City and Missouri bar associations and law schools; and fraternal and charitable organizations.

**Historical Note:**

Kimbrough Stone, the son of William Joel Stone, a Democratic governor of Missouri and U.S. senator, was judge of the Sixteenth Missouri Circuit Court (Independence Division) from 1913 to 1917, and judge of the U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals, Eighth Circuit from 1917 to 1947. He was presiding judge from 1938 to 1947 and remained active in the work of the court until his death in 1958. His home was in Kansas City, Missouri.

Stone married Lucy May Cockrill on October 3, 1906. They had two daughters—Elizabeth Louise, who married Albert E. Bassett, a government employee and businessman, and Marjorie May, who married Samuel E. Otto, an army officer.

Stone was a member of the Country Club Christian Church, Kansas City, Missouri; the American, Missouri, and Jackson County bar associations; Beta Theta Pi; Phi Beta Kappa; Phi Delta Phi, and Order of the Coif.

f. 1-40        Correspondence, General Family, 1903-1958. With Senator William J. Stone; family business and political affairs. With his daughters, Elizabeth Louise Bassett and Marjorie May Otto and their families; mostly social. Bassett correspondence mentions political and business affairs. Otto correspondence concerns international affairs when Colonel Otto is stationed outside the U.S.

- With K. Stone's sisters, Mabel Stone and Mildred Parkinson (Mrs. John G.); family business. With the Cockrill family in the 1930s; the farm problem. With Francis M. and Ida Cockrill Wilson; political affairs.
- f. 41-73 Correspondence, Family History and Genealogy, 1918-1958. Genealogical inquiries; information on Stone family in Maryland. Remembrances of William J. Stone. Planning, building and maintaining the Stone monument in Nevada. Correspondence with Ruth Towne, biographer of William J. Stone.
- f. 74-190 Correspondence, General and Social, 1928-1958. With personal friends and occasional acquaintances. Mostly social. Scattered discussions of political and judicial affairs. Correspondence with friends in LaJolla, California, where K. Stone vacationed. Extensive correspondence with John T. Harding, Kansas City attorney.
- f. 191-238 Correspondence, Government and Politics, 1905-1958. Stone's election to 16<sup>th</sup> Missouri Circuit Court; appointment to U.S. 8<sup>th</sup> Circuit Court of Appeals.
- f. 239-280 Correspondence, Government and Politics, 1905-1958. Campaigns of Francis M. Wilson, 1928 and 1932; campaign of Guy B. Park, 1932; state office seekers, 1932-1933. With Democratic leaders in Missouri: Reed, Clark, Cochran. With congressmen, senators, and executive officials on behalf of proposed legislation. With J. Edgar Hoover, in the 1940s and 1950s about communism.
- f. 281-351 Correspondence, General Judicial, 1928-1958. Correspondence among the judges of the 8<sup>th</sup> Circuit Court of Appeals concerning the operation of the court, judicial conferences, bar association. With state and federal judges and court officials. Explanations of procedures used in the 8<sup>th</sup> Circuit Court of Appeals; discussions of perennial judicial problems; memorials to deceased judges; social life of the court.
- f. 352-380 Correspondence, Official Judicial, 1917-1955. Papers labeled "official correspondence" in Stone's office. Operation of the court. Assignment of judges and other matters of internal business. Similar in nature to part of the material in folders 281-351.
- f. 381-392 Correspondence, Miscellaneous, n.d. Correspondence, mostly social and business.
- f. 393-470 Correspondence, General Organizations, 1911-1958. With charity organizations, fund drives, schools, churches, clubs, fraternities, social organizations. Country Club Christian Church, Roman Catholic leaders, University of Missouri, Beta Theta Pi, Jacob Billikopf, Chinese and Jewish relief organizations.
- f. 471-538 Correspondence, Professional Organizations. With both city and state bar associations in Missouri, Kansas, Nebraska, Oklahoma, Arkansas, and Minnesota. Law schools: University of Missouri, Kansas City Law School, and Harvard School of Law. Federation of Justice. American Bar Association correspondence extensive during presidency of Guy B. Thompson, 1931-1932.
- f. 539-558 Correspondence, Professional Organizations. Correspondence either received by or turned over to Judge Stone upon the occasion of the dinner given in his

- honor by the Kansas City Bar. Book containing the proceedings of the dinner.
- f. 559-718 Correspondence, Private Business, 1897-1958. Purchases of clothing and equipment for the family, payment of bills, storage of household goods. Securing of lodging, St. Paul; Kansas City; St. Louis; Washington, D.C.; Virginia Beach; LaJolla. Private investments; Farm and Home Savings and Loan Association.
