**Abstract:** Letters and papers of a Democratic delegate-at-large and chair of the State-Wide Committee for the Revision of the Missouri Constitution. He was chair of the Committee on Rules and Order of Business, and served on the Committees on Executive Department; Legislative Department; Printing; Reporting and Publications; Convention Library, Information and Research; and Phraseology, Arrangement and Engrossment.

### **Historical Note:**

Allen McReynolds was born in Carthage, Missouri, on 7 November 1877. He attended the public schools there, and graduated from the University of Missouri in 1901. He was admitted to the Missouri Bar in 1903. An active lawyer and businessman in southwest Missouri, McReynolds also served in many capacities in state government. In addition to his service on several state committees and commissions, he was a state senator from 1935 to 1943 and a member of the University's Board of Curators from 1945 to 1951.

McReynolds married Maude Atwood Clarke, also of Carthage, and they were the parents of two children, Helen Elizabeth McReynolds Rozier and Allen McReynolds, Jr. Allen McReynolds died on September 29, 1960.
