### **Historical Note:**

James Barger Bullard was born in Boone County, Missouri, on February 10, 1847 to John Montgomery Bullard and Parmelia Barger. After the Civil War, Bullard and his brother John went out West with the United States Army, serving in the scout service under General George Crook. James served as chief scout while John was Crook's first assistant. The scout service took

the brothers all over the West from Canada to New Mexico. John Bullard was killed by Native Americans near Silver City, New Mexico. James B. Bullard eventually returned to Boone County, Missouri, where he became a prominent farmer.

Bullard married Mary Clemency and they had a daughter also named Mary Clemency. After his first wife's death, Bullard remarried to Nancy Leona Nichols, the daughter of Ira Nichols and Sarah Sapp. Their children included James Barger Jr., John F., Ora L., Charles Edward, and Wallace Audley.

James B. Bullard died on February 13, 1920 and was buried at the New Salem Baptist Church Cemetery in Ashland, Missouri.
