SYNOPSES

John Dillingham (CD 1-4; DVD 1)

John Dillingham talks about his family's long history in Kansas City, his connections to the American Royal, Kansas City Livestock Exchange, the Golden Ox Restaurant, and his military service among other topics. Mr. Dillingham also submitted a video memoir for inclusion.

Inez Johnson and Kaye Malins (CD 5, 6)

Inez Johnson and Kaye Malins personally knew Walt Disney and his family and are founding members of the Walt Disney Hometown Museum in Marceline.

Pat Hiatte (CD 7-9)

Born in Jefferson City, MO in 1951, Hiatte grew up in Columbia, Brentwood, Ballwin, and then returned to Jefferson City where he graduated high school. Hiatte talks about his long career (1974-2009) with the Frisco, BN, and BNSF Railroad companies.

Brian Mahieu (CD 10, 11)

Born in Ohio, Mahieu grew up and went to school in Missouri. He is an artist with a BFA degree from Columbia College is an artist. He discusses his fondness for the outdoors, his art, several businesses he was involved in, including art galleries and a successful daylily hybridization operation. Brian discusses his sexuality, being part of a cult-like fundamentalist group, depression, losing everything, and finding his husband. Brian was interviewed his last week living in Missouri before moving to the Pacific Northwest with his partner to start a new chapter in their lives. Mahieu donated several paintings to the State Historical Society of Missouri before leaving Missouri.

Bob Nichols (CD 12, 13)

Originally born in Cowell, AR in 1942, Nichols moved to Cabool, MO in 1945. Nichols is a Navy veteran. He talks about his military service along with his long railroad career with the Frisco and BN Railroad companies where he primarily dealt with the railroad's real estate divisions.

Norbert Shacklette (CD 14, 15)

Born in Bunker, MO in 1942, Schacklette grew up in Reynolds County. After graduating high school, he moved to St. Louis for work. In 1960, Schacklette took a job with the Missouri Pacific Railroad as a telegraph operator station agent. In this interview, Shacklette talks about his 40-year career with the Missouri Pacific Railroad.

Charles Digges (CD 16)

Born in Columbia, MO in 1919, Digges grew up in close proximity to the University of Missouri campus. After graduating from Hickman High School, he enrolled at the University of Missouri. Upon completing his degree, Digges served in the United States Air Force during World War II and the Korean War. Following his military service, Digges joined Columbia's esteemed "Round Table," and engaged in the insurance and investment business with Rollins-Vandiver (eventually named Rollins, Vandiver, and Digges) and later The Insurance Group. Though he retired in the early 1990s, Digges remained a fixture in Columbia, particularly at University of Missouri events which he attended from the 1920s until his death in 2019.

John Viessman (CD 17-19)

Born in Waynesville, MO in 1947, Viessman spent much of his early life in nearby Rolla. After graduating from Rolla High School, he enrolled at the University of Missouri-Rolla before completing his undergraduate degree at Southwest Missouri State University. He taught briefly in Maries County before accepting a position as tour guide and curator with Missouri State Parks in Jefferson City. In this role, he traveled extensively throughout the state working on projects related to Missouri history, particularly oral history interviews. Since 1970, Viessman has also operated Americana Antiques in Vienna, MO. CD 19 in this collection features Viessman explaining the history of Vienna during a walking tour of the Old Jail Museum Complex and the Maries County Courthouse Square.

Dr. Russ Zguta (CD 20, 21)

Born in Volia Yakubova, Ukraine in 1941, Zguta spent part of his youth in a displaced persons camp at the conclusion of World War II. In 1949, his family immigrated to the United States and settled in Pennsylvania. He earned a bachelor's degree from Saint Francis University, and a master's degree and PhD from Pennsylvania State University. From 1967-2017, he served as a professor of history at the University of Missouri-Columbia, including brief periods as the chair of the Department of History, Department of Economics, and the Department of Romance Languages.

Ken Kamper (CD 22-25)

Ken Kamper was born and spent his youth in Saint Louis City and Saint Louis County. When he was eighteen, his family moved to a farm in Gasconade County, and he worked there for three years before moving back to Saint Louis. Starting out running blueprints, Kamper completed night classes at Washington University and eventually became a professional engineer. He retired as a chief engineer. In addition to his engineering career, Kamper was also interested in the history of Daniel Boone. Since the 1980s, he has researched and written extensively on the Boone Family, including historian positions with the Boone-Duden Historical Society, Boone Society, Daniel Boone and Frontier Families Research Association, and the Boone Home in Defiance, Missouri.

Arlie Carter (CD 26, 27)

Born in Hooker, Missouri, in 1931, Carter spent the majority of his life in Pulaski County. During his youth, he witnessed the construction of Fort Leonard Wood and later worked at the fort in the summer during World War II. In 1944, he was assigned to a PX at Fort Leonard Wood that served the German prisoners of war. At the conclusion of the war, Carter worked in the oil fields of Kansas and Oklahoma, and later did agricultural labor in California. In 1950, he accepted a full-time position at Fort Leonard Wood and remained there until 1990.

Mel West (b.d.f. 1)

Mel West was born on May 21, 1924 in Golden City, Missouri. West graduated from the University of Missouri in 1947 and returned to Golden City to become a dairy farmer. Soon after establishing himself as a farmer, West moved to Dallas, Texas to attend the Perkins School of Theology. Upon graduation, West returned to Missouri to serve in the Methodist Church. West headed the Office of Creative Ministries, and he devoted his work there to serving the rural poor of the state. After his retirement from the church, West started the PET (Personal Energy Transportation) Project, which built affordable, hand cranked bicycles for people who could not use their legs.

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
