Historical Note:

Rosa (Rose) E. Jackson Barker was born on December 11, 1877, in Savannah, Missouri, to Nick and Alice Cooper Jackson. Little information could be found regarding her early life. She married Richard H. Barker on January 13, 1894, in Johnson County, Kansas, and together they moved to Jackson County, Missouri. Barker was a member of the Cyrill's Catholic Church and a member of the Kansas City chapter of the auxiliary to the Brotherhood of Locomotive Firemen and Engineers. Barker died on December 11, 1952, and is buried at the Forest Hill Cemetery in Kansas City, Missouri.
