Introduction

Approximately 0.5 cubic feet of material was loaned for photocopying.

The papers consist of twelve photocopied scrapbooks compiled Elmer F. Pierson after his retirement from the Vendo Company, a manufacturer of vending machines. The scrapbooks contain items pertaining to Vendo and items concerning Pierson's philanthropic and civic activities.

Elmer F. Pierson was born in Kansas City, Missouri, on August 27, 1896. He graduated from the Kansas City School of Law in 1919. After graduation, Pierson worked in the real estate business and was associated with the Farm and Home Savings and Loan Association before founding the Vendo Company, a manufacturer of vending machines, with his brother, John T. Pierson, in 1937.

Pierson was active throughout his life in business and civic affairs in Kansas City, Missouri. He served as president of the Kansas City Chamber of Commerce in 1945, director of the National Association of Manufacturers in 1946, president of the National Automatic Merchandising Association in 1947, director and later vice president of the United States Chamber of Commerce in 1957 and 1960-1961 respectively.

Pierson's lifelong interest in the arts and education prompted him to donate time and resource to the University of Kansas City, later the University of Missouri-Kansas City. In particular, Pierson provided funding for the Pierson Auditorium in the University Center. Pierson also donated the Pierson Sculpture Garden and numerous works of art to the Nelson-Atkins Museum of Art, land for a public park and for the Pierson Junior High School to the Turner Unified School District in Wyandotte County, Kansas. Additionally, Pierson established a distinguished professorship in music at Bethany College in Lindsborg, Kansas.

Elmer F. Pierson's first wife was Marie Kahmann (1899-1969) and his second wife was Georgia Cox Spencer (1912-1997), whom Pierson married in 1970. Pierson died in Miami Beach, Florida on February 15, 1982, and is buried at the Forest Hill Cemetery in Kansas City, Missouri.
