Historical Note:

Livestock trading in the United States has its origins in railroad construction and business; this interlacing of fields would allow railroad shipping for livestock across the United States and facilitate trade for farmers. Before 1871, no railroad systems cut across the Mississippi River, leading Chicago financer Samuel M. Allerton to finance the creation of bridges and a stockyard that would furnish livestock trade in the Midwest. As a result, national City, Illinois, became the official site for what became known as the St. Louis National Stockyards Company, located across the Mississippi River from St. Louis City, Missouri. The stockyards officially opened for business on November 19, 1873, and consisted of 100 acres of land that housed 15,00 horses and mules, 3,000 cattle, 17,000 hogs, and 20,000 sheep.

After the stockyard was incorporated in 1907, National City became a self-operating company town; this included expansion in its business practices to include an exchange market but would also have its own fire department, policing, banking, post office, hotel, and newspaper publication. The St. Louis National Stockyards Company would see a rapid decline in business throughout the 1980s as cattle rearers began to work more directly with meat-packing companies and skipped over stockyards entirely. In 1996, the company sent out an order to all remaining residents of National City that they would have to vacate their homes. Illinois law stated that incorporated villages needed 50 or more residents to stay operational. When Illinois ordered a census evaluation in 1997, there were not enough residents to maintain the incorporation title.

Arrangement:

The collection has been arranged alphabetically.

Scope and Content Note:

This collection contains annual reports, annual stockholders meeting notices, articles, newspaper clippings, and legal documents pertaining to the St. Louis National Stockyards Company's history and functions. The documents provide a timeline of the company's existence and the importance that the company had on the expansion of the livestock trade and the meat packing industry not only in the region but on the national stage as well. The materials in this series examine periods from 1873 to 1979 and are arranged alphabetically.
