Biographical Note:

Sondra Stein received her bachelor's degree from the University of Michigan at Ann Arbor, where she was also introduced to political activism and began participating in anti-war and economic inequality demonstrations. Stein came to St. Louis in 1968 to attend Washington University in pursuit of her master's degree and PhD in English. She became involved in the Washington University Liberation Front, a student-led anti-war activist group, and other activist groups in the area. She also taught in Washington University's nascent Women's Studies program and led the Feminist Coalition on campus. Following the completion of her PhD in 1976, Stein began teaching at New Hampshire College's School of Human Services. In 1980, she founded the Women's Educational and Vocational Enrichment program in Boston, Massachusetts, which taught adult literacy and job readiness to low-income minority women. While in Boston she was part two different socialist feminist groups, the Abortion Action Coalition, and the Campaign for Antiracist Education.

In the late 1980s, Stein became the director for Massachusetts' Commonwealth Literacy Campaign under Governor Mike Dukakis where she established literary initiatives in Massachusetts and other states. Following Dukakis' retirement from office in 1991, Stein went to work with National Governors' Association's State Literacy Exchange until 1993, when she moved to Washington D.C. to become a Senior Research Associate at the National Institute for Literacy (NIFL). There, she developed standards for nation-wide adult literacy programs and served as director for NILF's Equipped for the Future program, a standards-based, collaborative adult literacy system reform initiative.

Scope and Content Note:

The Sondra Stein Papers contain correspondence, newsletters, newspapers, and flyers regarding Stein's activities as a women's rights, peace, political, and LGBTQ+ activist as well as her involvement in several such organizations and movements. Materials of note include booklets regarding issues such as women's rights, abortion, social conditions for women, LGBTQ+ rights, labor, and the Vietnam War. The materials date from 1969 to 1978 and from 2000 to 2001 and are arranged alphabetically.
