

## **S0533 Normandy School District-UMSL Founding Records**

**1957-1968**

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**Donor information:** The Normandy School District - University of Missouri-St. Louis Founding Records were donated to the Western Historical Manuscript Collection on February 21, 1992 by Bruce Smith of the Normandy School District.

### **Historical note:**

The papers document the efforts of various individuals and the Normandy School District to establish a junior college, and later UMSL, on the former site of the Bellerive Country Club. Classes began in 1960 at the Normandy Residence Center (NRC) under the auspices of the University of Missouri (UM), and the campus became the University of Missouri-St. Louis (UMSL) in 1963.

In 1957, the Bellerive Country Club made it known that it was placing its 128-acre club in Normandy on the market in preparation for a move farther west. Many prospectors proposed sub-dividing it for housing and commercial developments. At this point the Normandy School District preemptively requested to purchase 8 or 10 acres for an elementary school building which would be needed to support the residents of such developments. Bellerive Country Club officials indicated that they could not sell a portion of the site, however, after the site had been on the market for a few months, they asked if the Normandy Board of Education would be interested in the entire site for the campus of a long-discussed junior college. During the spring and summer of 1958, citizens of the community were called in by the Normandy Board of Education to discuss the possibility of a junior college. After indications of support for the project, a bond issue was which received more than two-thirds majority approval and the site was purchased.

Bellerive Club officials notified the Normandy Board of Education that it would turn the full facilities over on May 31, 1960. As a result, the Board of Education established a group of twenty-eight men and women who became known as "The Committee of 28." The Committee held a conference in Columbia with officials of the University of Missouri, which had the sole responsibility of accrediting all junior colleges in the state. Dr. Elmer Ellis, president of UM suggested that one way in which the project could begin immediately would be for the Normandy School District to build and maintain the campus facilities, while all course work would be provided by University Missouri-Columbia campus. Students would pay UM a fee of \$15.00 a semester hour; non-Normandy resident students would pay an additional fee of \$90.00 per semester to the Normandy School District as their share of cost of operating.

The Committee of 28 returned from the Columbia conference determined to proceed with the establishment of a "Normandy Residence Center" on the newly acquired country club property. The University of Missouri required a minimum initial enrollment of 100 students to make the school financially possible. A questionnaire was sent to all students in Normandy High School to determine their interest, netting about 75 potential students for the fall term. Monsignor Hoflich, Superintendent of the Diocesan High Schools, made arrangements to send the questionnaire to all parochial schools, netting the required total number of students.

In May of 1960 the NRC held its first registration period. By the close of the third day registration, enrollment had reached 180 students and further enrollments were turned away. It is estimated that over 100 students could not be accepted. In the second year of operations, enrollment closed after numbering over 300 students. To accommodate the largest number possible, the NRC pushed enrollment to 550 students in September 1962.

In 1961 the University of Missouri System began examining the possibility of acquiring the Normandy Residence Center for the development of a four-year University of Missouri campus. In January of 1963 Representative Wayne Goode introduced a bill to the 72nd General Assembly to permit the Normandy School District to convey the property to the University of Missouri. The bill was subsequently signed into law by Governor John Dalton, and became effective October 13, 1963. That same year, the University of Missouri System also acquired campuses at Rolla and Kansas City. The University of Missouri took title to the NRC property in the fall of 1963 and officially established the University of Missouri-St. Louis.

### **Series Descriptions:**

#### **SERIES 1. CORRESPONDENCE, 1958-1964. FOLDERS 1-53.**

This large series consists of letters to and from various individuals involved in the establishment of UM-Normandy Residence Center at the Bellerive Country Club. The material is processed chronologically from earliest to most recent.

#### **SERIES 2. NORMANDY RESIDENCE CENTER - UNIVERSITY OF MISSOURI, 1959-1968, FOLDERS 54-69.**

This series includes general documents such as brochures, flyers, course listings, and other materials regarding the Normandy Residence Center. The material is processed chronologically from earliest to most recent.

#### **SERIES 3. COMMITTEES, MEETINGS, RESOLUTIONS, 1958-1963. FOLDERS 70-112.**

This large series documents the various bond issues, policies, and committees which were involved in the founding of UM-NRC and UMSL. The material is processed chronologically from earliest to most recent.

#### **SERIES 4. SURVEYS, c. 1958-1961. FOLDERS 113-117.**

This small series documents several surveys which were conducted in an effort to support the need for higher education in the Normandy area. The material is processed chronologically from earliest to most recent.

#### **SERIES 5. PRESS RELEASES, 1961-1963. FOLDERS 118-119.**

This series documents the press releases regarding the sale of Bellerive Country Club to the University of Missouri. The material is processed chronologically from earliest to most recent.

#### **SERIES 6. NEWSPAPERS, 1958-1963. FOLDERS 120-159.**

This series consists of newspapers, clippings, and photocopies of articles. The material is processed alphabetically and chronologically from earliest to most recent.

**SERIES 7. PUBLICATIONS, 1960-1964. FOLDERS 160-167.**

This series consists of photocopies, fragments, and complete publications regarding the Normandy School District and UMSL. The material is processed chronologically from earliest to most recent.

**SERIES 8. YEARBOOKS AND SCRAPBOOKS, 1960-1967. FOLDERS 168-170.**

This collection is processed chronologically from earliest to most recent.

**SERIES 9. PHOTOGRAPHS, 1946-1964. FOLDERS 171-177.**

The series consists of 96 images. The photographs are arranged chronologically from earliest to most recent and include images of the Bellerive Country Club, the Normandy Board of Education, construction and early students at the NRC, and the UMSL dedication ceremonies.

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
