Historical Note:

United States Highway 66 was a continuous route connecting Chicago, Illinois, to Los Angeles, California. The numerical designation 66 was approved on April 30, 1926, and construction began on November 11. U.S. Highway 66 was a conglomeration of an already existing network of State-managed roads, including the Lone Star Route and the National Old Trails Road. The highway extended 2,448 miles diagonally, linking hundreds of rural and urban communities throughout Illinois, Missouri, Kansas, Oklahoma, Texas, New Mexico, Arizona, and California. Entrepreneurs Cyrus Avery and John Woodruff, who lobbied for creation of the route, are credited with the establishment of U.S. Highway 66. Avery also pushed for the creation of the U.S. Highway 66 Association which paved and promoted the highway. By 1938, Route 66 became the first highway to be completely paved.

As one of the country's main thoroughfares, Route 66 was the primary route for east to west migration and tourism. Increased highway traffic resulted in locally owned establishments such as restaurants, motels, gas stations, and roadside attractions along the highway. The decline of Route 66 came after President Eisenhower signed the Federal-Aid Highway Act of 1956. The bill authorized funding for the construction of 41,000 miles of the Interstate Highway System. Interstate 40 and 44 replaced major segments of Route 66, and on June 26, 1979, the American Association of State Highways and Transportation Officials eliminated the designation of U.S. Highway 66. In October of 1984, the final section of the original road was replaced by Interstate 40 at Williams, Arizona. In 1985, the highway was officially decommissioned.

Preservation and commemorative efforts continue today through public and private organizations, as well as local, State, and Federal agencies. Locations along Historic Route 66 have been listed in the National Register of Historic Places. The National Park Service Route 66 Corridor Preservation Program provides financial and technical assistance to individuals, nonprofits, local, State, Tribal, and Federal agencies to help preserve significant resources along the route. In 2016, the Route 66 Road Ahead Partnership was formed with a mission to revitalize and sustain Route 66 as a national icon.

Arrangement:

The collection has been arranged into 13 folders and 2 oversize boxes.

Scope and Content Note:

This collection contains brochures, maps, menus, publications, newspaper articles, photographs, and postcards related to cities, businesses, and roadside attractions along United States Highway 66 in Missouri. This collection also includes materials from the Route 66 Association of Missouri, such as "Motor Tour" booklets and newsletters. The audiovisual materials consist of two DVDs and two VHS tapes related to traveling along historic Route 66. The two oversize

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boxes contain ephemera, such as stickers, matchbooks, pins, highway signs, and calendars. The collection is arranged by subject.
